CCCC Receives \$2,471, 478 U.S. Dept. of Labor Grant to Create Accelerated Training Program in Aviation Maintenance and Certification. College Targets First Enrollees – Fall 2015.

In ceremonies at The White House in our nation's capital, Cape Cod Community College President John Cox, and Dean Robert Cody accepted a U.S. Department of Labor workforce training grant totaling \$2,471,478. Awarded by Vice President Joseph Biden, and Secretary of Labor, Thomas E. Perez, the grant will enable the College to immediately accelerate its development of a unique FAA certified airplane maintenance training program on Cape Cod, meeting a critical need for highly skilled technicians in airframe and power plant repair and certification.

"We are extremely pleased that the federal Department of Labor has provided these funds that provide an immediate jump start to this training program, and will continue support over the next three years for an industry where jobs are waiting now, not only in the Cape region, but within Massachusetts and across the nation," stated President Cox. We are equally grateful to our Congressional Delegation for their leadership and support of this program, especially Senators Elizabeth Warren and Edward Markey, and Congressman William Keating," he added.

National, regional, and local airlines have expressed strong support as has the U.S. Coast Guard's aviation group at Joint Base Cape Cod, among many.

"The overwhelming support received from a wide variety of industry members including Jet Blue, Cape Air, and the U.S. Coast Guard, has been a powerful driver of our desire to meet critical needs. We've heard repeatedly that there are military service personnel as well as private airline employees just waiting to go through our program and gain certification. This grant today is the final piece of a very large collaboration, and we are thrilled," concluded President Cox speaking from the Washington ceremonies.

Over the past year, the College has been aggressively working to create a unique accelerated training program in airframe and power plant repair and maintenance, after hearing from numerous sectors of the aviation industry about the critical shortage of highly skilled technicians. A state award of \$1.95 million in this year's budget allowed CCCC to begin the development of this program, and negotiations are underway surrounding hangar/teaching space at the Barnstable Municipal Airport.

Federal DOL funds will allow the College to seek additional faculty, purchase equipment, and related training materials, and ramp its program up to accept students starting in the Fall of 2015 or before, depending upon when details can be finalized, and FAA certification received. This program would become one of the few training centers on the Eastern Seaboard supporting the airline industry and only the second in Massachusetts offering certification in both Airframe Structures and Power Plant Theory and Maintenance. This program will create a pathway for a career.

The jobs waiting for these program graduates are high paying jobs with career advancement potential. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 2012 certified aircraft mechanics earned a mean salary of \$55,690 per year, with typical salaries running between \$45,670 and \$65,750.

Students completing the program can expect great job prospects, according to a recently released report by aircraft giant, Boeing. In looking globally at the rapidly expanding airline industry, Boeing reported that it saw the need for more than 600,000 airline maintenance technicians by the year 2031. Many older aircraft mechanics in the United States are at retirement age now, and major turnover can be expected through the year 2020, providing new opportunities for those with FAA certifications.

"With the federal Department of Labor funding, the College will begin to hire program faculty and staff as our hangar space is acquired and outfitted, explained CCCC President John Cox. "The final timeline is not quite clear, but the College is hopeful we can open the program for Fall semester, 2015," he concluded.

TRUSTEES CONFERENCE | Gov. Patrick tells state education forum that Mass. should brag about its brain power

Gov. Deval L. Patrick says Massachusetts has an ego problem. But it's not that its head is too big; it's that it is too small. The governor was speaking at the DCU Center Tuesday afternoon at the start of a conference for the Trustees of Massachusetts Public Higher Education that was sponsored by the state Office of Trustee Relations.

MCLA PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH | MCLA VP Cynthia Brown named interim president

The Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts board of trustees has taken a step toward finding a new president by recommending an interim leader and announcing the composition of a national search committee. Trustees also set a timeline to select a candidate by April 2015 and gave a positive evaluation to outgoing President Mary Grant, in addition to recommending a 3.5 percent pay raise during her final months. Trustees voted unanimously to recommend that Cynthia Brown, vice president of academic affairs, serve as interim from Grant's departure to the appointment of a new president. The recommendation is subject to the state commissioner of Higher Education's approval.

FITCHBURG STATE U PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH | Wish list for a new FSU leader

Fitchburg State University will never have another Bob Antonucci. That was the general agreement at Wednesday's public forum seeking input for the presidential search process. FSU President Robert V. Antonucci is retiring at the end of the school year after 11 years leading the university, and the school is selecting his successor. Don Irving, chairman of the presidential search committee, said the university will never find a clone of Antonucci, but they need to focus on what qualities their new president will have so they can find someone who is good for the school while recognizing that he or she may do some things differently.

COMMUNITY COLLEGES | Mass. community college students have an opportunity to study in the U.K.

An education company will make it possible for Massachusetts community college students to attend a business school in England, according to a press release. The Massachusetts Community College Challenge was unveiled this week as part of Governor Deval Patrick's trade mission to Europe. CEO of Shorelight Education Tom Dretler said the partnership will provide full scholarship, housing and airfare for two community college students to attend the undergraduate School of Business and Entrepreneurship at Bath Spa University for two years, according to the release.

LEGISLATURE | Legislative Q&A: State Rep. Paul Mark

In this last legislative session, state Rep. Paul Mark was appointed his first chairmanship — one to lead a subcommittee in investigating student debt. The joint subcommittee launched the investigation which took them to colleges across the state and ultimately filing a report outline the leading factors to growing debt. That, Mark says, help in advocating for the budget and next session he hopes to file a large piece of legislation based on those recommendations. Meanwhile, from bond bills to election regulation, Mark says the Legislature was able to accomplish a lot in the last two years. iBerkshires recently sat down with Mark to talk about what has been done and what is to come.

BRISTOL CC | Solar, shaded carport under construction at BCC

One of Bristol Community College's large parking lots is currently a construction site. A long, shiny steel roof has been erected at one end, one of eight similar structures planned to cover all five lots by the end of the year. When complete, it will be Massachusetts' largest solar carport, expected to generate 40 percent of campus energy needs, BCC officials said.

BUNKER HILL CC | Bunker Hill Community College Recertified as a 'Leader College' for Student Completion

Bunker Hill Community College has won recertification as a Leader College by Achieving the Dream, a national nonprofit dedicated to helping community college students succeed. BHCC is one of 16 institutions nationwide to win such designation for demonstrating sustained improvement and accomplishments on key student achievement indicators. "It is an honor for Bunker Hill Community College to be recertified as an Achieving the Dream Leader College," said BHCC President Pam Y. Eddinger. "We value our role in the National Reform Network, both as a learning college as well as an advocate for continuous improvement through evidence-based practices and broad engagement."

MASSASOIT CC | Massasoit Community College's response to rapes lauded

Within hours of a 20-year-old female student reporting to campus police that she had been raped in a wooded area near Massasoit Community College, students and the public had been notified via social media, phone and email; Brockton police were asked for their assistance; and additional safety measures were put into place on campus. Within days, the suspect was arrested, and the school's rapid, well-coordinated response was credited with helping.

MASSASOIT CC | Safety on campus: Security measures continually updated for colleges

Laurie Maker, Executive Director of Communications at Massasoit Community College in Brockton and Canton, said the institution has also made several policy updates since the Sandy Hook shooting. “We have updated our emergency infrastructure,” she said. “We’ve invested in campus sirens at our Brockton campus, which is our largest campus.” The Massasoit administration has also introduced new notification software in recent years, Maker said. This software lets members of the school community know through messages on their computers and handheld devices what to do during an emergency situation. The college administration has also held more training sessions for faculty and staff to teach them how to handle an active shooter situation.

MT. WACHUSETT CC | Holyoke Early Literacy Initiative wins 2014 Gateway Cities Innovation award

In addition to HELI, the Gateway Cities Innovation award was given to: Mount Wachusett Community College/Fitchburg High School GEAR UP for their college preparatory programs; Greater Lawrence Advanced Manufacturing Academy which created a dual enrollment program that allows high school students to take classes in advanced manufacturing

HOLYOKE CC | HCC bomb scare caused by coded message over social media advertising drugs:

The bomb scare that evacuated the Donahue Building and disrupted the entire Holyoke Community College campus Thursday was not due to an actual bomb, but by what officials called a coded message over social media about the sale of drugs, officials said Jennifer Mieth, spokeswoman for state Fire Marshal Stephen D. Coan, said investigators determined no one was in danger during the incident, and there was no bomb.

WORCESTER STATE U | Authorities investigate armed sexual assault at Worcester State University

A student at Worcester State University reported being sexually assaulted at knifepoint on campus last week, authorities said. The student, whose gender was not disclosed, reported being assaulted by someone armed with a silver knife, the Worcester State public relations office said.

GREENFIELD CC | Op-Ed: By Bob Pura: Threshold for opportunity

Greenfield Community College has opened its doors to a new fall semester for the 52nd time. Approximately 5,500 students will attend this year; 60 percent women and 40 percent men with an average age of 27. Sixty-four percent will attend part-time and 36 percent are full-time students. Some students arrive directly out of high school, like Matt who was a good kid who did good work all through high school, who now soars having found his life’s passion and voice at GCC. Others arrive having earned a GED like Shonie, who after many years and many jobs as a parent without a high school degree is eager to re-enter the workforce, now as a college graduate.

MCLA | MCLA Receives ‘Dual Enrollment’ Grant

Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts has been awarded a \$26,000 grant from the Massachusetts Department of Education to fund its participation in the Commonwealth Dual Enrollment Program during the 2015 fiscal year. Through the program, academically qualified high school juniors and seniors can register for one or more classes at MCLA free of charge, receive an introduction to college life and the academic expectations of a college course, while earning college credits.

MCLA | College teams up with MCLA, local schools to rethink science education

The National Science Foundation has awarded a grant of \$810,876 to the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts to work in conjunction with the College and the North Adams Public Schools for a program called Teaching to Learn: Improving Undergraduate Science Education Through Engagement in K-7 Science.

ROXBURY CC | Coakley Pledges \$225M In New Student Aid

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Martha Coakley campaigned Thursday with U.S. Sen. Elizabeth Warren around the idea of making college more affordable, shifting her focus on the trail from early education to higher education. Coakley and Warren joined Roxbury Community College President Valeria Roberson on the school’s campus for a roundtable discussion with students and faculty where Coakley outlined a \$250 million plan to boost financial aid and make it easier for students and families to save for college.

BRISTOL CC | Happy 10th, BCC! Bristol Community College marks a decade in Attleboro

From a modest beginning with a few dozen students taking night courses at Attleboro High School, Bristol Community College’s Attleboro campus has emerged as a full-fledged, degree-granting institution with plans to further expand its enrollment of more than 1,300. The campus now located in the former Texas Instruments complex on Field Road plans to celebrate its 10th anniversary in Attleboro as a full-time satellite college with a range of activities beginning Monday and continuing through Saturday.

WORCESTER STATE U | Worcester State University To Rename Civic Engagement Center for Representative Binienda

Worcester State University has announced it is naming its civic engagement center after alumnus and longtime 17th Worcester District 09/22/2014 - State Representative, the late John J. Binienda, '70, D.P.A., h.c. '14. Binienda's career was devoted to civic engagement and service. Earlier this summer, Binienda donated \$100,000 to Worcester State University to support and expand its Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement's programs. The university will rename the center The Honorable John J. Binienda Center for Civic Engagement.

MIDDLESEX CC | MCC trustees vote to name main city building for Cowan

Middlesex Community College trustees voted Thursday to name MCC's main Lowell campus after retiring President Carole Cowan. Royall Mack Sr., trustees Chairman, made the motion to the full board, and it was unanimously approved to recognize and laud the achievements of Cowan during her 38 years of service to the college, including the last 24 years as president.

BRISTOL CC | With BCC solar canopy project underway, parking could be a bit of a pain for a while

Bristol Community College's Elsbree Street campus has 320 fewer parking spaces this fall. But they haven't actually gone away. The spaces are temporarily unavailable while the latest capital project on campus is underway: the construction of solar canopies that will cover roughly 5 acres of parking — lots numbers 6 through 10 — in the southern end of the campus. A long row of canopy roofing has already been erected on 20-foot-tall beams in lots 9 and 10, which are surrounded by construction fencing. When those lots are finished, their parking spaces will reopen, and construction will proceed to the next lot, then the lot after that. Campus officials said they expect the project will be completed by December.

BRISTOL CC | Editorial: Sunny side up — SouthCoast solar keeps growing -

Innovation will be the watchword as the world makes the critical transition from fossil fuels to sustainable sources of energy. Bristol Community College's new carport solar farm meets that criteria. Once it's done, five of the Fall River campus's parking lots will be covered with enough solar panels to provide 40 percent of the school's energy needs. That's in addition to green buildings, rooftop solar and a green curriculum that includes training workers for the offshore wind industry set to land in SouthCoast.

SALEM STATE U | Driscoll enters Salem State University garage dispute

The city has entered into the fight between Salem State University and neighbors of a proposed 4 1/2-story parking garage the school wants to build by next autumn. After studying multiple locations, Salem State announced earlier this year that it planned to construct a \$16 million, 725-space garage next to Peabody Hall on its north campus.

WESTFIELD STATE U | Westfield State University celebrates new \$33 million science center with groundbreaking ceremony

State, local and community dignitaries joined Westfield State University officials for the ceremonial groundbreaking of the \$33 million science center that will change the landscape of Western Avenue. Interim President Elizabeth H. Preston told those gathered under a tent at the construction site on Thursday afternoon that the 54,000-square-foot building, scheduled for completion in August 2016, will not only serve as a state-of-the-art educational facility, but its design will also enhance the surroundings.

FRAMINGHAM STATE U | Framingham State to hire diversity exec

Framingham State University is planning to add to its cabinet of vice presidents by hiring a new diversity administrator by the end of the year, the school announced Tuesday. ...The university's announcement coincides with a national higher education magazine's revelation Tuesday that Framingham State is one of the recipients of its Higher Education Excellence in Diversity Award this year - a first for the university.

GREENFIELD CC | Op-Ed: By Robert S. Cohn: Supportive community

Education and philanthropy are alive and well in Greenfield and Franklin County. Franklin County, being the most impoverished and rural county in the commonwealth, has much to be proud of. Our community has always given generously to endeavors that support our schools, fund education and help our neighbors in need. The Greenfield Education Foundation is five years strong in helping public education in Greenfield. With the generous support of individuals and businesses, the GEF has contributed close to \$250,000 over the last five years to help fund such items as Scholastic newsletters for all grades K-3 students, musical instruments for the middle school, band uniforms, graphing calculators for the high school math department, flip cameras for movie making, equipment for chemistry and physics labs and materials for the school libraries.

MASS MARITIME | Roll Tide: Power Shift Along Southern N.E.'s Coast

MRECo is part of the concentration of marine-science technology along the East Coast and in southeastern Massachusetts that is emerging as the source for some of the nation's most noteworthy and commercially viable tidal-energy systems, called arrays. The Massachusetts Maritime Academy in Buzzards Bay is taking a strong initiative in supporting marine hydrokinetics. Last year, the school announced a \$7 million plan to build a tidal-energy dock jutting out from Taylor's Point at the end of the Cape Cod Canal, where the academy is located. The two-phase project will result in a pier extending 250 feet south, then angle out toward the canal and continue another 950 feet.

WORCESTER STATE U | Worcester State focuses on student retention, recruitment with new facilities

With an eye to its future, work is being completed on the 58-acre Worcester State University campus that officials hope will attract and retain more students and keep the university visible in a competitive market. On Sept. 9, dozens celebrated the opening of the newest building on the campus — a 150,000-square-foot residence and dining hall that will house 400 students and features a new restaurant-style eatery that seats 650 and overlooks the university's athletic fields. Sheehan Hall is the latest completed project in a 10-year, \$200 million building and renovation plan, according to the university. A groundbreaking ceremony will be held soon for a new \$45.5 million Wellness Center, scheduled to open in 2016.

BERKSHIRE CC | Ready, set -- STEM

Berkshire Community College is piloting a program to help 21 students get a head start in their STEM field studies. The students, who recently graduated from high schools throughout Berkshire County, were inducted in May into BCC's STEM Starter Academy (SSA). They then took part in a pre-semester intensive summer program which continues with extra support and special programming offered to them during the school year.

FITCHBURG STATE U | Fitchburg High, Fitchburg State team up to provide Advanced Placement Italian class

Fitchburg High School recently started offering a free Advanced Placement Italian language course through Fitchburg State University, the School Committee learned at its meeting Monday night.

MCLA | MCLA, Williams to Partner with North Adams Schools on Science

Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts has received an \$810,876 grant from the National Science Foundation for a collaborative venture with North Adams Public Schools and Williams College. The four-year project, which runs from Sept. 1 through Aug. 18, 2018, allows undergraduates at MCLA and Williams to work with college science professors and teachers in North Adams Public Schools to develop science units based on the Next Generation Science Standards, and to teach curriculum to students in grades K-7.

NORTH SHORE CC | NSCC celebrates golden milestone

In each foyer of North Shore Community College hang oversized photographs and bios of former students who have done well for themselves. "I like those because their stories are like myself," said NSCC student Kirirath Saing. "English was not their first language, they made it in the U.S. and they made their way at North Shore Community College. They are really good-feeling stories." North Shore Community College, which turns 50 this year, is at its heart a good-feeling story.

FITCHBURG STATE U / UMASS LAW | FSU, UMass Law School partner in law

Starting this fall, students interested in careers in the law will have an opportunity to earn their bachelor's and law degrees in just six years, thanks to a new articulation agreement between Fitchburg State University and the University of Massachusetts Law School. The agreement, signed Aug. 20 by Fitchburg State President Robert V. Antonucci and UMass Law School Dean Mary Lu Bilek, will allow qualifying students to complete three undergraduate years at Fitchburg State before proceeding directly to UMass Law for a three-year juris doctor program (completing their bachelor's degrees while on the UMass Law campus).

FRAMINGHAM STATE U / MASSBAYCC | A new look for FSU

Framingham State University students returning to campus the last few weeks saw a different place from what they left only a few months before, as the school continues work on a slew of new and ongoing initiatives. ...Part of that project has also involved tearing down sections of the large white building at the site and renovating the historic portion, known as the 1812 House, for use as a new college planning center Framingham State plans to run in partnership with MassBay Community College. That new center, which is intended to help local students, especially underprivileged students, prepare to go to college, won't be done until next March, but the university plans to hire its new director within a couple months, Hamel said.

FRAMINGHAM STATE U | First look at new Framingham State U. dorm revealed

Framingham State University officials will be meeting today to discuss the next steps for the campus's new \$44 million dorm, the first few renderings of which have been released by the school. The 316-bed facility, which will be built in the Maynard Road parking lot, will be financed through the Massachusetts State College Building Authority, which pays for projects with fees collected from the students that use the constructed facilities. Dale Hamel, Framingham State's executive vice president of administration, finance and information technology, said the agency's board is expected to consider approval of the funding next month, and that the state's board of higher education should give its OK in November.

MCLA | U.S. News and World Report ranks MCLA a top public liberal arts colleges

The Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts has been ranked as one of the top public liberal arts colleges in the country for the fourth consecutive year in a row. The designation of ninth -- one higher than last year -- comes from the U.S. News and World Report ranking released on Tuesday. "I think the four years in a row reflects the continued success of the institution," MCLA President Mary Grant said Wednesday. "Ranks are something we do take with a grain of salt. But I think it's one indication of many of the continued strong programs at the institution."

NORTHERN ESSEX CC | State Money Helps High School Students Take College Classes

This year, four local high schools will be able to continue to participate in Early College Programs in partnership with Northern Essex Community College, thanks to \$175,000 which was included in the state budget. Students from Amesbury, Newburyport, Haverhill, and Methuen high schools will benefit from the funding, which cover teaching costs as well as scholarships.

WESTFIELD STATE U | Westfield State University is a great place for veterans says

U.S. News & World Report ranks Westfield State University as one of the 50 "Best Colleges for Veterans." Westfield State issued a news release Tuesday, the same day U.S. News came out with its widely touted college guide. Overall, Westfield State ranked 115 in the top tier of the "Best Regional Universities – North" up from 123 last year.

BRIDGEWATER STATE

JetBlue's University Gateway Program and Cape Air Announce New Partnership with Bridgewater State University JetBlue Airways (NASDAQ: JBLU) and Cape Air recently announced a new partnership with Bridgewater State University (BSU). BSU is the newest addition to JetBlue's University Gateway Program, a pilot talent pipeline which partners with top university aviation programs and regional airlines such as Cape Air. BSU is the airline's first school alliance in its Boston focus city.

CAPE COD CC | Cape Cod needs Cape Cod Community College

This week Cape Cod Community College announced an accelerated seven-week home health aide certificate program. Unveiled in partnership with the Visiting Nurse Association of Cape Cod, this program is the epitome of what our community college does well. ...4Cs' President John Cox's signature airframe/power plant program is another fine example of where the community college can shine. Training the Cape workforce for global job opportunities and creating a "destination" program for those outside the region, this aviation tech program will put the college on the map and, eventually, help stabilize enrollment a bit.

MASSASOIT CC | Massasoit Community College celebrates new soccer field

On Saturday Massasoit Community College held a ribbon cutting ceremony to celebrate its new soccer field. Mens coach Rui Estrela says the \$200,000 field is a vast improvement from what players had to deal with in years past. Officials on both the men's and women's teams are looking forward to starting the soccer season off with a new field. Massasoit president, Dr. Charles Wall, says the teams deserve it. Players say passing the ball will be easier and they won't have to worry about falling.

MT. WACHUSETT CC | Training program spells out workplace expectations

In addition to sharing its module with about a dozen clients, Operon put it in the hands of high schools and colleges that are preparing students for the workplace. At Mount Wachusett Community College in Gardner, the elements of Operon's program are incorporated into its non-credit Advanced Manufacturing Industrial Readiness Training Program (AMIRT), funded through a state Department of Labor grant. MWCC Dean of Workforce Development John Henshaw said that the curriculum responds to gaps identified by area and national employers. ...They referred to a University of Massachusetts Dartmouth study of 1,000 advanced manufacturing companies across the state that showed that above all, employers are looking for workers who are reliable and trustworthy.

CAPE CODE CC | Seven weeks to a new career at Cape Cod Community College -
